HOW DOES SMART911 WORK?

Smart911 allows citizens to provide the additional details that 9-1-1 call takers may need in order to assist them during an emergency. When you dial 9-1-1 today the information received by the 9-1-1 call center can be limited based on the type of phone you are calling on. With Smart911, anytime you make an emergency call from a phone registered with your Safety Profile, the 9-1-1 systems recognizes your phone number and automatically displays your profile on the screen of the call taker who receives your call.

At a time when you may be panicked, or unable to communicate, or it could be unsafe to communicate, Smart911 ensures that the details you would need to tell 9-1-1 are immediately available in the event you cannot verbally provide them. Smart911 is free, private and secure.

WHY SHOULD I USE SMART911?

Smart911 can help protect you, your loved ones, and other members of your household. By creating a Safety Profile with Smart911 during a calm moment, you can take the time to ensure that the information is correct and accurate and exactly what you would like to be communicated to emergency response teams in an emergency. Smart911 is free to all citizens.

Pedestrian Safety

Dial 9-1-1 in an Emergency

- Walk, jog or bike with a friend, preferably during daylight hours.
 - ◊ Always tell a family member or friend when and where before you go out.
- Walk or run with your dog. Receive training through The Woodlands Township Neighborhood Watch, Dog Walker Watch®. You don't need to have a dog to take advantage of this training!
 - ◊ Anyone that routinely uses the pathway system in their neighborhood can quickly determine something out of place. This training helps you to recognize suspicious activity and how to report it.
- Take your cellphone with you, and dial 9-1-1 if you feel in danger.
 - ◊ Call immediately; do not wait until you're home to call.
- Do not talk on your phone while walking, jogging, or bicycling.
- Do not wear headphones for music/phone. If you do, leave the volume on low.
- Alter or vary your route pattern; run/walk/bike in familiar areas if possible.
- Carry a noisemaker (whistle). Get training in self-defense.
 - ◊ RAD classes offered through the Montgomery County Sheriff's Office.
- Be aware of your surroundings at all times. The more aware you are, the less vulnerable you are.
- Use mobile application that can track your location and inform family members of the route you will be taking.

Safety Tip of the Month:

The National Safety Council recommends every family have an emergency plan in place in the event of a natural disaster or other catastrophic event. Spring is a great time to review that plan with family members.

Have a home and car emergency kit.
